## President's Annual Report

I n my inaugural address last year (has it really gone that fast?), I expressed the wish for the Friends to have a normal year of open bookstores with regular hours and lots of volunteers, steady sales (stores and Amazon), in-person meetings, and increased presence at literary events and at Friends-sponsored Library programs. With the exception of the Annual membership meeting, we have more than met expectations. Here are some highlights of our activities over the last year:

• *Robust store and Amazon sales.* Yes, both stores reopened well over a year ago, and Amazon never quit during the pandemic. None of this would be possible without our stalwart and enthusiastic volunteers. Most of our volunteers came back after the pandemic layover, and we recruited new folks, and the success of the stores and Amazon is due entirely to their tireless efforts. (see the income statement on page 5 for amazing financials.)

• *Return of the Annual Big Sale.* This hugely popular event was held over two days in the Community Room of the Central Library. We almost ran out of books to sell!

• *Bay Area Book Festival.* Berkeley's premier literary event was a great place for the Friends to

socialize, sell, and drum-up publicity for the Big Sale and our wellstocked stores. Our booth never lacked for browsers and customers.

• In-person Board meetings. In September, we resumed meeting in-person. Although there

are advantages to Zoom, our members agree that ideas and conversation really flow when we're in a room together.

• *BPL Staff Scholarships.* The Friends are particularly proud of our contribution to Library staff who are pursuing the master's degree in library science, and we expanded our support to staff who

are working on an AA or BA or who need particular courses to augment their library specialization. This year the Friends awarded \$16,300 in scholarships to library staff.

• Participation in Friends-sponsored Library events. We're funding most of the Library's public programming and it has been gratifying to participate in the Summer Reading

Kick-off, Benvenue Beats, End of Summer Celebration, and National Afternoon Out. Our table always gets a steady stream of visitors eager to share their library story and hear about the Friends.

For the second year in a row, we were thrilled to be able to contribute \$150,600 to the Library for FY 2023-2024. If you subscribe to the Library's electronic newsletter or grab the paper copy, you'll notice that there are multiple events going on all the time at all branches. The range of offerings is nothing short of amazing! The popularity of art, cultural, and literary activities is the surest sign that people are (cont'd page 2)

Terry Gillen really enjoyed the novel *Mercury Pictures Presents* by Anthony Marra. "Wonderful cast of characters whose lives are connected by World War 2 and Hollywood."

Ruth Grimes was entertained by Graham Greene's *Travels with My Aunt.* "I was encouraged to read this by another volunteer, and it was not at all what I expected. He claimed that it was the first book he wrote just for fun."

Kristi Kenny was enthralled by *Morgan is My Name* by Sophie Keetch. "Remember *The Mists of Avalon* by Marion Zimmer Bradley? This is a new, feminist retelling of the life of Morgan le Fay, focused on her early life, and from her own point of view."

Mara Melandry recommends *The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny, and Murder* by David Grann. She writes: "Add in terrible weather, starvation, murder, conflicting descriptions of events, courtroom drama...a fascinating story."

Vivian Pisano raced through *The River of Doubt: Theodore Roosevelt's Darkest Journey by* Candice Millard. "An engrossing, harrowing account of Roosevelt's scientific expedition down an uncharted and dangerous tributary of the Amazon. A nonfiction thriller and a page-turner!"

Sayre Van Young was royally entertained by *The King: The Life of Charles III* by J.R. Ward. "Engrossing, even though we know how it ends; you'll love him you'll hate him, you'll miss his mother."

Rob Walker suggests: *Super Infinite—The Transformations of John Donne*, by Katherine Rundell. "Sparkling and very modern biography of John Donne: the poet of love, sex, and death." **\*** 

## Evelyn Gahtan

Longtime Friends member and beloved Reference Librarian Evelyn Gahtan died in her nineties, at home, in mid-August.



After serving as a riveter in the Douglas Aircraft Assembly Plant during the latter war years, she started working in the Library's Cataloging Department in 1950; she moved to the Reference Department in 1953 and worked there for the next 57 years.

She was a tena-

cious researcher who always, *always* found answers to even the most arcane or involved questions...even if it took days. An old-fashioned librarian, she nevertheless took to the computer gleefully, using it to compile an extensive directory of all the periodicals the Library owned. She rarely argued; most discussions ended with a shrug of her shoulders and "It will be what it will be." That laid-back quality was not in evidence, though, in 1965 when she fought the City and became the first City employee to request and be granted a maternity leave upon the birth of her daughter Maia, thus paving the way for future mothers pursuing careers.

Evelyn was a wonderful artist who for many years was in charge of library exhibits and displays, including the wall of posters she annually designed for Friends book sales in the library garden. She could cut out letters for displays backwards and upside down!

Her husband was an architect, her daughter is a renowned art scholar. Evelyn Gahtan had a steel-trap mind; she knew more than the rest of us, especially about Berkeley and Library history, and was always willing to share. She was hard working, focused, a joy to work with... simply one of the BPL's finest reference librarians.

**But what Do I Have to** *Do***?** If you've gotten this far in the *Bookmark*, and if you're a new Friend, you may be wondering what's involved in being a Friend of the Library? You've paid your annual membership fee, and you're rather enjoying reading this newsletter. (I picture readers on a couch, feet up, holding the newsletter in one hand and a glass of wine fine in the other.) Now what?

First off...there is no secret handshake. There are no required meetings. Financial investment? Paying annual dues is all; larger donations are welcomed but not required.

**Do I have to volunteer?** Nope, though that too would be welcomed. Every Friendly volunteer I've talked to in the last decade has said volunteering was one of the smartest things they've ever done. Books...other book lovers... bookstores...libraries...what's not to like? And it's fun. As an organization running two bookstores, we almost always need additional volunteers. If you're interested, drop by either bookstore for a volunteer application, The application is also available online at our website: berkeleylibraryfriends.org.

Where Can I Donate Books? If you have just a few books to donate, you can take them to any of the Library's branches. They have limited storage space, so can accept only a handful or so at a time. Larger quantities can be taken to either of our two bookstores. We appreciate mid-sized boxes or sturdy bags. The bibliographical tidal waves tend to ebb and flow, so if you have more than 5 boxes, please call first to be sure we'll have space in our workrooms for them. Phone numbers are on the next page.

A reminder: we are not a recycling site. We can accept only books in good condition. Take a look at our website (see paragraph above) for a list of what we can and cannot accept. Or you can call either bookstore, and a friendly volunteer (see second paragraph above) will tell you what the bibliographical parameters are. **\***
